Of the deaths no less than 23 were due to diseases of the digestive system, for which affections there were 410 admissions, 305 admissions occurred from fevers, 199 from debility, 188 from respiratory diseases, 29 from nervous affections, 26 constitutional diseases, and 357 from other causes.
